ADAM WINKLER

We the Corporations: Adam Winkler Explains How American

Businesses Won Their Civil Rights

Adam Winkler, Professor of Law at UCLA School of Law, is a specialist in American constitutional law and the Supreme Court. He is the author of We the Corporations: How American Businesses Won Their Civil Rights (2018) and Gunfight: The Battle over the Right to Bear Arms in America (2011) and, according to a 2016 study, he is one of the top 20 law professors for citations by the courts. He served as co-editor of the Encyclopedia of the American Constitution (2d Edition), his articles have appeared in numerous publications, including the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Slate, and Scotusblog, and he is a frequent commentator about legal issues on radio and TV news and talk shows.

Creating Robots that CareMaja Matarić is an award-winning

robotics designer whose research focuses on developing robot-assisted therapies for children with autism spectrum disorders, stroke and traumatic brain injury survivors, and individuals with Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia. She is a professor and the Chan Soon-Shiong chair in the USC Computer Science Department and Department of Pediatrics, founding director of the Robotics and Autonomous Systems Center, and codirector of the USC Robotics Research Lab. Matarić has published extensively, is the author of the introductory robotics textbook *The Robotics Primer* (2007), and is an associate editor of three major journals.
